

# **Ohio DECA Fact Sheet**

#### **DECA**

DECA prepares emerging leaders and entrepreneurs in marketing, finance, hospitality and management in high schools and colleges around the globe. The activities enhance their preparation for college and careers by providing co-curricular programs that integrate into classroom instruction, applying learning in the context of business, connecting to business and the community and promoting competition. The student members leverage their DECA experience to become academically prepared, community oriented, professional, responsible and experienced leaders. Membership in DECA is open to all students who are enrolled in a state approved career-technical education program in an aligned career field, such as Business, Marketing or Finance.

#### **Board of Directors**

The Ohio DECA Board of Directors is the primary governing body for the organization. The make-up of the Board consists of a talented group of educators, organization and community leaders and professionals. Meeting regularly throughout the year, the Board of Directors establishes policies relative to the interpretation and implementation of the constitution and bylaws. The Board of Directors includes voting members and two ex-officio (non-voting) members that include the Board's President and the Chartered Association Advisor.

### **Ohio DECA Executive Council**

The Executive Council is the educator advisory group for Ohio DECA. The Executive Council consists of one advisor from each of the 12 Ohio DECA districts. The Executive Council Representative is elected by each district according to policies and procedures established by the local advisors within the district. A council member must be an advisor of an active chapter and must have taught a minimum of two years. An advisor must have local administration approval to hold an Executive Council position.

#### **Career-Technical Education**

Career-Technical Education (CTE) provides students of all ages with the academic and technical skills, knowledge and training necessary to succeed in future careers and to become lifelong learners.

### **Ohio Career-Technical Education Vision**

Every Ohio secondary career-technical education graduate is prepared for successful employment and ongoing education, and every Ohio business has the workforce it needs to prosper.

#### **Ohio Career-Technical Education Mission**

Provide leadership and support for the successful delivery of quality career-technical education to drive quality workforce development in Ohio.

# **Practice Answers Designed to Help You Frame Your Responses**

### 1. As a legislator, why should I provide funding to career-technical education?

Career-Technical Education inspires students to identify paths to future success and provides students opportunities to demonstrate the knowledge and skills necessary for high school graduation and beyond. Students learn through career exploration, take college courses and earn industry credentials. They receive customized learning that matches their passions and interests with their career aspirations.

### 2. As a businessperson, how can I help Ohio DECA?

We have many opportunities in business and marketing education as well as DECA. Ultimately, all these opportunities help us. You can provide internships or job placements for students, host field trips, become a guest speaker, act as a DECA judge, help a student prepare for competition, participate on an advisory committee, and/or contribute funds to the Ohio DECA Association, a non-profit organization.

## 3. How do you start a DECA chapter in your school?

First, you must work with your administration to start a career-technical business program or to convert a business program in your school into a career-technical education pathway. It takes time and energy to convince administrators and school boards, but it is worth it. Promotional materials and resources are available at deca.org.

### 4. What is the organization of CTE in Ohio?

CTE is offered in comprehensive districts, compact districts and joint vocational school districts (often called career centers), in grades 7-12 across the state of Ohio. All Ohio CTE workforce development pathways are required to include at least four courses within their program of study, as well as include opportunities for students to earn postsecondary credit, include opportunities to earn relevant industry credentials, participate in career-technical student organizations, participate in work-based learning and earn technical skill attainment.
